There were 28 entries to be considered. All were delivered in an anonymous and a very useful format: two PDF files, one with diagrams, the other with diagrams and solutions. I solved every entry to force myself to play at least once through every solution.

The general level of the competition was a pleasant surprise. Most entries showed a clear and interesting idea with a good construction. Compositions, which focused on the quantity of solutions instead of the quality, were not interesting enough to be included in the award.


I did not conduct an extensive search for anticipations, but one unfortunate predecessor was found:





A harmonious composition with analogous and interesting solutions. Black's 1<sup>st</sup> move opens a line for wRa1, which will pin a black unit on white's 1<sup>st</sup> move. Both key pieces, bBa5 and bSd1, have options, which fail because of similar reasons. 1.Bc7? and 1.Se3? would interfere on the future pinning line. 1.Bc3? and 1.Sc3? would interfere the line of wBb2, guarding f6. Additionally, the bB has two possibilities, which fail because of a check to the white K, and the bS can also capture the wBb2. Black's 2<sup>nd</sup> move must release the guard of c6, but with care. The wK is skilfully placed for a dual-avoidance, to guard d6 and to make black play unique. Obviously the bPd7 has only two possible moves and the bQ many more, but this imbalance is unavoidable. Finally, in the mating move there is also dual avoidance. Here the motives are simple, but nicely similar.


In one pair of the solutions Black activates his Queen to capture first the wR/B and then a wP for a nice Zilahi. The only tiny blemish is that once white moves his line-piece, once opens its line: 1.- Bd5/b4. In the other pair black makes two Knight moves to open a future mating line and to interfere with bQ's line of defence. White, in turn, pins the static knight and mates along the opened line.






This HoTF has two pairs of solutions, both with the wQ mating on either c3 or d5. Initially these squares are both occupied by white and doubly guarded by black. Moreover, the lines of the wQ are interfered with bPs. The pair in which white pieces sacrifice themselves to open lines for the wQ is more pleasing than the one with the wQ moving and capturing twice.






The black unit on c4 captures to allow a white piece to recapture and free a square for the wK. As black's 2<sup>nd</sup> move, the bR unguards e6 and interferes with a bB to allow the mating move. It is slightly annoying that in part a) black's first move also opens a line for the white recapturing piece.
